

1995 a year in Wicklow GAA

At the Kilmacanogue Club Annual General Meeting, at which Mr Des Fox presided, the meeting agreed to appoint an up and coming footballer Mr Christy Fox as the clubs first youth officer.

At the Baltinglass AGM Seamus Kelly was elected as club Chairman.

Arklow Rock Club Chairman Eddie O' Regan was the lucky winner of €1500 in the GAA County Lotto.

At the Dunlavin Club AGM Chairman Andy O' Brien thanked Dermot Heatley for his work as trainer of the senior team and congratulated St Kevin's post primary school on winning a Leinster championship. Jim Bollard was elected as chairman and Frank O' Neill as secretary. Niall Moore took on a duel role as Vice Chairman and PRO.

At the Blessington Club AGM Michael Sargent and Chris Magee were elected Chairman and Secretary respectively.

Tinahely Club Chairman Paddy Murphy spoke proudly of the clubs achievements over the past year regarding the resurfacing and draining of the pitch at a cost of approx. €35,000. He also wished Jim "Butcher" Darcy ever success in his new role as manager of the county minor football team.

At the Blessington Dinner Dance George Allen was selected as Senior Player of the Year while Jack Boothman made a presentation to two recently departed clergy men Canon Richard Stokes and Fr Maurice Moore, Club person of the Year was awarded to Chris Magee.

Willie Halligan, Maureen Ferguson and Seamus Gaskin won spot prizes at a very successful An Tochar Ladies Football club Dinner Dance.

At the February County Board Meeting Mick O' Hagan from St Patricks Wicklow was appointed County Hurling Officer while Pat Kinsella from Arklow Geraldines called on delegates attending the National Congress not to be led away with pious resolutions and promises regarding the abolition of Rule 21.

At the Ashford club AGM Club Chairman Sean Lally made a presentation to Pat Lawless on his elevation to County Chairman. Andy Merrigan, Liam O'Loughlin and Eddie O' Byrne won the county Scór quiz held in the Ormond Hall Arklow.

At the Valleymount Annual Dinner Dance Leo Osborne received the Club "Hall of Fame" award. George Murphy provided the music for the dance in the Arklow Rock club rooms on St Patrick's night.

The unexpected death of Johnny Fox, from Kilmacanogue, sent shock and great sadness through the entire GAA community. One of the biggest funerals ever witnessed in the county where people from all walks of life attend to pay their respects to a most respected GAA man and hardworking public representative.

Shillelagh held their annual Dinner dance in the Royal Hotel Carlow where "Quality Street" provided the music.

The "Hurlers on the Ditch" namely Willie O' Loughlin, Des Burton, Colm O' Byrne and Jim Mulkern won the long running Aughrim Club Table Quiz final.

Suin Furlong from Arklow Geraldines ran in the Dublin City Marathon to raise funds for the clubs juvenile teams.

At the Tinahely Club Dinner Dance Chairman Pat Doyle made presentations to the members of the team of 1969 who won the county junior championship.

Theresa Lawless from Kilmacanogue won the top prize of £3,500 in the County Wicklow GAA Lotto.

Tony Lambert, Damien Kelly, Paul Nugent and Martin Lenehan were on the team that won the Wicklow County GAA Golf Classic held in Blainroe Golf Club.

Brian Gleeson Senior Hurler and Footballer with St Patricks Club Wicklow were promoted to the position of Executive Officer with the Sports section of the department of Education.

Winners in the Baltinglass Club annual golf classic were Paddy Magee, Paddy Salmon, Joe Fagan and Matt O' Brien.

Arklow Rock Parnell's senior team and county champions of 1970 were honoured at the county senior hurling final.

Kathleen O' Neill from Tinahely was appointed to referee the All-Ireland Ladies Junior Football Final Cork v Tyrone.

62 year old hurling veteran Eamonn Murray retired on a winning note when he was a member of the Avoca team that defeated Annacurra in the Kenny Cup final.

Dublin star Brian Stynes was the guest at the Eire Óg Juvenile presentation where he made special presentations to the club underage stars of the year.

HURLING HAPPENINGS 25 YEARS AGO



January

February

Wicklow Hurlers overcame Meath 1-13 to 2-9 in the first round of the Kehoe Cup.

Subs: Willie Carey and David Moran. Players and Officials were disappointed over the ruling that John Henderson could not play for the county for the remainder of the league due to having played in the Kilkenny Championship when the league commenced the previous year. In the NHL Louth defeated Wicklow 1-8 to -10. At the County Hurling Convention an Arklow Rock motion to scrap the U21 championship was passed. The senior hurlers bounced back to winning ways when they defeated Derry 1-10 to 1-7 in the NHL.

March

Wicklow minors opened the league campaign with a good win 2-12 to 1-7 over neighbours Carlow. John Keogh was the star scoring seven points. Wicklow's Don Hyland scored 1-4 for his side when they defeated Monaghan 2-13 to 0-8 in the NHL.

April

The U21 hurlers made their exit from the championship when they were defeated by Westmeath 2-11 to 2-6. In the Kehoe Cup final Wicklow Senior Hurlers had victory snatched from them in the dying minutes against Westmeath –Score Westmeath 1-10 Wicklow 2-5. Wicklow defeated Westmeath 1-19 to 3-3 in the minor league semi-final. John Keogh was the Wicklow star scoring ten points.

May

Wicklow had a comprehensive win over Louth 6-16 to 0-8 in the first round of the All-Ireland "B" Championship. Wicklow powered their way into the All-Ireland "B" final with a very clear cut win over Fermanagh 2-16 to 1-6. Team: Michael Neary, Lar Byrne, John Henderson, Tom Byrne, Colin Byrne(0-2), Casey O' Brien, Robert Doyle, Christy O' Toole, Nigel Byrne, Shane O' Loughlin (1-0), Paddy Devlin, Timmy Collins (0-1); John Keogh (0-5), Sean Byrne 1-2), Don Hyland (0-6). Arklow Rocks turned on the power when they defeated Kilcoole 4-11 to 3-3 in the C.S.H.L.

lune

Wicklow captured their first ever home All Ireland "B" Hurling championship when they defeated Kildare 3-12 to 1-8. Donal Lenehan scored the winning point for Aughrim in the dying seconds of their Intermediate championship game with Hollywood, final score 2-10 to 4-3. Jack Reilly, ARP,

scored 1-2 of his sides total when they defeated St Patrick's in the C.S.H.L. Final score 4-5 to 3-7.

July

Hollywood had a good win over Annacurra, 4-7 to 3-4 in the I.H.C. Liam Toomey, Kevin Tyrrell and Sean Doyle were in great form in this win. Glenealy took another step closer to the S.H.C. final when they defeated St Patricks Wicklow, 1-16 to 0-11. Shillelagh corner forward Anthony Cullen contributed 2-2 to his sides tally when they defeated Aughrim 4-10 to 1-10 in the I.H.C.

August

In the I.H.C local derby, Aughrim defeated Annacurra 1-5 to 1-3. It was a move that brought Donal Lenehan, Aughrim full forward, out to mid field where he scored the total Aughrim score of 1-5 and gave his side the ticket to the county semi-final. Dunlavin added the U14 hurling "B" championship title to their U14 football success when they defeated Avondale 7-2 to 5-3. A goal by super sub John Fleming in the third minute of extra time gave Kiltegan victory 3-8 to 1-13 over Shillelagh in the I.H.C semi-Final.

September

In the final of the Sally Cup, Ray Nolan was the star scoring five points for his team when Avondale had a good win over Arklow Rock in the final by 1-10 to 0-9. The county hurling final ended in a draw; Carnew Emmets 2-7 Kiltegan 1-10.lt was the first county hurling final to end in a draw for over 50 years. Billy Byrne scored six points to make sure his side got their ticket to contest the Billy Byrne Cup Final when Avondale defeated St Patricks Wicklow 1-7 to 1-5.

October

Kiltegan Senior Hurlers made it three in a row when they defeated Carnew Emmets 1-7 to 1-5 in the county final replay. Eamonn Murray, the Avoca hurling legend (aged 62), ends his career in a winning note when Avoca defeated Annacurra in the Kenny Cup Final 2-8 to 1-8.

November

Avondale celebrated a double victory when their juniors won the County Championship while David Moran led the "Dales" U21 to victory after a great battle with Carnew Emmets. In the Leinster championship, Kiltegan rocked the Dublin champions on the score line 1-10 to 1-3. John Keogh had an outstanding game scoring 7 points.

December



Emmets to win the county minor championship. In the minor hurling "B" championship St Patricks Wicklow just pipped Avondale in a ten goal thriller 5-6 to 5-3. In the N.H.L Wicklow had their first defeat at the hands of Derry 3-6 to 0-11.

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ADAPTING TO THE NEW NORMAL

Adversity breeds innovation, and this is definitely the case when it comes to the birth of Wicklow GAA TV. With restricted numbers allowed attend our Championship games for this season, Wicklow GAA brought forward plans to introduce a dedicated streaming service for our games.

We had a large number of interested vendors, and at the end of a thorough selection process it was decided to partner with 247.TV as our Streaming provider and with the team at Garden County Sport for the match-day production – a three-way partnership to deliver the best quality experience for viewers. Not everything went perfect, we experienced some issues along the way – it was a steep learning curve for everyone involved!

Wicklow GAA TV will stream over thirty live Championship games over a seven-week period, an intensive schedule that has involved serious investment of time, finances and energy. The feedback has been superb and with the main aim being to provide an outlet for our Clubs supporters to view their matches, this initiative has been a real success, albeit in very difficult circumstances.



1892 The Forgotten Year

In 1984, the centenary of the foundation of the G.A.A was celebrated on a lavish scale at National County and Club level, and it is no reflection on the men of that time to say that the jubilee celebrations in 1934 could not even remotely compare with the extravaganza of that year. All the G.A.A.'s notable occasions have been appropriately honoured but, strange to relate, the centenary on one of the most significant developments in the history of Gaelic games appears to have been forgotten-the establishment of the inter-county championships.

That development derived from a decision of the 1882 Congress at Thurles to allow county champions pick from all the clubs in the county when selecting the county team. It was a revolutionary decision. Heretofore the champion club represented the county in the provincial and All-Ireland championship, which led to rather restricted interest in intercounty competition: simply, the fact that a club would be representing a county

it alone after 1892.

Another notable decision of that historic gathering at Thurles a century ago was the reduction of teams from 21 to 17 players and making a goal equal to five points. Both these had far-reaching effects on the development of both hurling and football, especially the re-evaluation of the goal which did away with the spectacle of teams retreating en masse to their own goal area to defend the advantage of a major score. But undoubtedly the one that had the greatest influence on the direction which Gaeldom eventually took

was the 'county pick' rule. One can only summarise what would have happened if the original rule had remained in force. Would Croke Park ever have housed such huge attendances on All Ireland Final days in September if clubs and not counties contested the finals. County loyalty as an extension of

an extension or parish loyalty is one of the glories of Gaelic games —instance Donegal in last year's championship and indeed many other counties over the

in an All-Ireland final occasioned little more that mild interest outside the borders of the parish concerned. But under the new dispensation all that changed-if not dramatically, it did steadily with every passing season. For more than two decades after this decision was taken, county champions continued to have the selecting of county teams in most counties but, apart from one instance, there was no case of a club 'going

decades.



Kiltegan Intermediate County Champions 1995

It was the year when Kiltegan contested and won both the Senior and Intermediate Hurling finals while their junior team reached the county semi-final. The seniors were joining the elusive three in a row club when they came through a hectic final encounter with Carnew Emmets. The intermediate team which is being honoured today defeated Aughrim in a hurling classic. Intermediate Final.

Scoring three points in the last three-minutes, two of them in additional time gave the men from the "West" victory over a brave Aughrim side. The game looked to be heading for a draw until Keith Furlong shot from a seemingly impossible angle 40 years out sending the ball sailing over the black spot with seconds remaining and no time for Aughrim to mount an attack.

Up to the 17th minute neither team had registered a score until Trevor Leeson and Brendan Barnes registered two points for Aughrim three minutes later Aughrim had registered two more pints when Sean O' Shea and Shane O' Loughlin found the target. It was the 26th minute when Kiltegan's Keith Furlong sent to the Aughrim net. Aughrim responded immediately when Sean O' Shea collected from the puck out, sent the ball to the Kiltegan net. Joey Lenehan and added to Aughrim tally with a great point while Keith Furlong sent over from a free for Kiltegan. Just on half time Joe Lenehan sent the ball into Sean O' She who duly dispatched the slitor to the back of the Kiltegan net to leave the half time score 2-5 to 1-1.

Within two minutes of the resumption Billy Doyle had the ball in the Aughrim net. The Kiltegan come back was on the way. When Keith Furlong and Eugene Byrne sent over two points the Aughrim lead was reduced to two points. Aughrim introduced Damien Byrne and seconds later from a pass from Shane O' Loughlin sent the ball to the Kiltegan net. However this did not frazzle the Kiltegan men who were now growing in confidence. Keith Furlong sent over a point from a free in the 16th minute. In the 19th and 26th minute Eugene Byrne sent over two 65's that reduced the deficit to two points. Two points from frees by Keith Furlong levelled the sides with only a minute of additional time remaining the same player got the all-important pointing the dying seconds from an imposable angle to send the Sean O' Farrell Trophy to Kiltegan.

The Hurling Scene

Although the club haven't made any records on hurling fields the game dates back to 1887. It is recorded in the newspaper Sport that Bray Emmets brought a hurling team to Courtfoyle (near Ashford) on April 17, 1887. They put on an exhibition in the hope of encouraging hurling in Wicklow. Obviously they were playing in the Dublin area at the time. It is also recorded that at the time the footballers were making history in the All Ireland series the junior hurlers were doing very well in Dublin. There are many records of their participation in junior hurling in Dublin down the years.

St. Cronan's mentioned in another chapter, played a lot of hurling in Dublin from 1919 to 1928 (when they returned to Wicklow) and catered for many of the Bray Emmets footballers. After coming into Wicklow in1934 Bray Emmets reached their first Wicklow senior hurling semi-final when they played Wicklow Town at Aughrimon September 22, 1934. They were beaten 4-02 to 2-02 after leading 2-02 to 1-01 at half time.

The Bray Emmets team on that occasion was as follows – T O' Beirne, H Jordan, R Mahony, M O' Neill, J Buckley, J Loughman, Billy Browne, B Kelly, S Farrell, J Murray, V Manahan, J Power, T Byrne, J Fitzgerald (captain), and C O' Neill. Their first hurling success in Wicklow came in 1949 when they won the Wicklow junior hurling championship. The final wasn't played until 1950. They beat Aughrim3-06 to 1-07 and the team included Garda Mick Enright and Garda Ned Kennedy. Mick Enright is now an Assistant Commissioner in the Garda Síochana and Ned Kennedy has become a Superintendent.

The panel who shared in Bray Emmet's first hurling win in Wicklow was as follows – Martin Brennan (captain), Christy Tobin, Jerry Barry, Brian Glynn, Pat Delaney, Mick Dwyer, Sean Dwyer, Seamus Quigley, Dave Howick, Ned Kennedy, Mick Enright, Jack O' Donnell, Pat Daly, Pat O' Brien, Bob Minogue, Mick Fleming, Jim Parley and Frank Currams. They were presented with their medals at Shillelagh Hotel on March 25, 1951.

This led to a resurgence in senior ranks and by 1952 the Emmets were hoping for a first senior title. Chemist Joe Butler, had arrived from Tipperary and Mount Sion's Frank Darcy came from Waterford. Veteran Avondale man Jimmy Jordan and sweet striking forward, John Evans, Kilkenny, had also joined the panel. Joining the majority of the junior winners they blended perfectly, but, nevertheless, started rank outsiders that year.

Wins in the first and second round surprised many, but Avondale were fancied to take the title when the teams lined up at Pearse Park, Arklow, on Sunday November 8, 1952. Bray Emmets made the running right from the word go, and when Avondale came back at them Frank Darcy was unbeatable in goal. Joe Butler was an inspiration to all and Brian Glynn, Paddy Delaney and John Evans took their scores like champions.

In the end Bray won well – 4-05 to 2-03 and Jimmy Jordan who had won many titles with Avondale had added one more for his adopted town. The team lined out as follows on that occasion – Frank Darcy, Dave Howick, Gerry Barry, Ned Lawlor, Tom Gavin, Joe Butler, Seamus Quigley, Mick Dwyer, Pat Burke, Brian Glynn, Paddy Delaney, Pat O' Brien, Ned Maher, Jimmy Jordan and John Evans. Three of that team figured prominently when Wicklow won their first Leinster junior hurling championship in 1954 – Brian Glynn, Paddy Delaney and Joe Butler.

Subs on the 1952 team was as follows – Harry Keely, Martin Brennan, Dick O' Leary, Peter Larkin, and Jimmy Garland. Bray reached the county minor hurling final in 1960 with the following team – T Dowling, D Arnold, N Walsh, T Mc-Cormack, R Neville, B Leggett, J Arnold, J Cassin, S Farrell, J Walsh, J Napier, P Butler, L Browne, B Reynolds and J McLoughlin. They were beaten by Glenealy in that final. They also reached the final in 1966 when they were beaten by Arklow. Team – John Greaney, Paddy Hackman, Ml Boyle, Tom Cleary, Martin Treacy, Walter Fortune, Paddy Crosbie, Terry Mangan, Martin Dodd, Stephen Lynch, John Cotter, Joe O' Connor, Martin Cranley, Bobby Greene and Mick Meaney.

Bray had a junior hurling win in 1963 and they will always be known as 'the 5-6 team'. They were actually beaten in the semi-final by Ballymoney 6-05 to 5-06, but Ballymoney played Paddy O' Brien the former Forestry College player. Following an objection and appeal the Hurling Board and the Co. Board ruled that Paddy was not eligible to play with Ballymoney on that occasion and Bray were awarded the game.

Emmets went on to beat Barndarrig in the final by 5-06 to 3-02. In all four games in that championship the team scored 5-06! The team on that occasion was as follows – Leo McEvoy, Jim O' Keeffe, Tom Wright, Johnny Lane, Mick Hanrahan, Joe O' Brien, Tony Kane, Pat Jordan, Roger Neville, Liam Duffy, Tom Walsh (captain), Tony Nevin, Tom Kenny, Seamus Quigley and Dick Arnold. Sub: Jack Napier. Other subs included Mick Brady and Jimmy O' Connor. It will be noted that Seamus Quigley won two junior medals with his senior medal. Tom Wright helped Wicklow to win a Leinster J.H.C. in 1964 and played against Armagh in the 1965 All Ireland J.H.C. semi-final.

Bray's last success in hurling came in the National Centenary year when they won the junior B hurling championship with the following team – Martin Browne, Jim Driscoll, Dan Hayes, Gabriel Plower, Sean O' Cualacain, Joe Dunne, Paddy Carroll, Fran Murray, Pat Kennedy, Donal O' Connor, Declan Kinsella, Harry Harte, Jim Delahunt, Dermot Greaney, Tom Conway. Sub: John Delaney. Other subs: Tom McGrath, Barry Minogue and David Murphy.



North Wicklow Gaels is an amalgamation of Kilcoole GAA club and Eire Óg, Greystones GAA club for juvenile hurling purposes. It does not cover all age groups, but is the platform used to keep hurling active in both clubs at older juvenile level. The first iteration was in 2014, set up by club representatives Colm Dorgan and Gerry Curry. There simply wasn't sufficient numbers to allow either club to progress on an individual basis and luckily both sides saw the mutual benefit of the project.

Initially, a couple of players from Newtown and Kilmacanogue helped to bolster the squad. In recent years, we have had Bill O'Brien from St Pats, Wicklow plying his trade under the North Wicklow Gaels banner and in 2020 Bill was joined by fellow clubman John O'Brien. We have made steady progress over the years due to the commitment shown by the clubs involved, but more importantly the parents and players themselves.

In 2019, we reached the U15 A final, going down by a single point to a very strong Michael Dwyers team. Hopefully, if the stars align for us, we can go one better this year and write our own little chapter in Wicklow hurling history.

Perhaps the most solidifying moment, as a team, for most of the current crop of players came in early 2018. It was obvious at the beginning of that year that neither Eire Óg nor Kilcoole would have enough

players to allow either club to enter the National Féile competition at U14 hurling. Due to the previous amalgamation in 2014 for Wicklow juvenile league and championship purposes we proposed to enter as a unified team. We were very grateful that this was approved by the county board and our adventure began. There was great excitement when we qualified from our group to represent Wicklow at national level. Like pioneers in the olden US, we headed west, full of hope as opportunity beckoned. We were based in Oran, Co. Roscommon and were treated like royalty. We managed to top the group and proceeded all the way to the divisional cup final. On our journey we beat teams from Roscommon, Mayo, Kerry, Meath and Cavan. Whilst it was a disappointment to lose a very competitive final, it was a great start for these lads in terms of competitiveness, but more importantly in terms of cohesiveness and camaraderie.

It is a testament to the will of the players and parents alike that most of that squad stayed together and that 18 of the panel for today's game will be underage again next year. By entering competitions such as the Féile and Leinster league at younger level, we hoped to progress our ambition of increasing the participation rates and making sure the lads enjoy themselves, whilst continuing to provide a hurling platform for the squad. Those Féile memories were a very solid stepping stone.
