as Hollywood Shamrocks. Hollywood GAA currently have two adult teams competing in the Intermediate and Junior A Championships. At underage, they are amalgamated with Valleymount, Lacken and Kilbride known as St. Kevin's. Throughout the decades the hard work and dedication of the local community has ensured the continued success of the club.

#### **Intermediate Football Team**

2023 has been a really good year for our club at all levels and age groups. We continue to field two competitive adult teams at a time when all clubs are struggling with player numbers.

Our intermediate team just missed out on finishing in the top half of Division 1A. A different result in just one game would have given them the opportunity to push for promotion to Division 1.

After a really strong group stage campaign our Intermediate team exited the championship at the Quarter-final stage with a narrow defeat to Donard/Glen.

Although, ultimately a disappointing conclusion to our campaign, management and supporters alike will be optimistic for a more successful 2024 with a number of young players being integrated into the squad and an additional cohort to come from this year's minor team.

## **Junior Football Team**

Our second team competed in Division 4 of the League and at Junior B in championship. An early, and very welcome, Hennessey cup competition got our Junior team off to an earlier start in the season than usual. Although we didn't feature in the knockout stages, the group stage was very useful to give players early game time and an opportunity for the younger players to transition to adult football.

Despite being competitive in the group stage of the Junior B championship we just missed out on making it to the knock-out stages.

Our nursery and Go-Games groups continue to go from strength to strength with numbers attending continuing to increase. Our thanks to all of our volunteers who work tirelessly with this group and to Wicklow GAA for arranging games and blitzes for this age group. On 18th August 2023, Kiltegan GAA & Camogie held a joint 50th jubilee celebration in St. Tegan's Hall to honour the first teams to bring home a junior hurling and camogie championship back to Kiltegan in 1973. This event was well attended by players and their families and was greatly appreciated by all involved.

Kiltegan GAA & Camogie Club welcomed their heroic Golden Jubliee Junior champions of Wicklow hurling and camogie from 1973 to a celebratory event in their honour on Friday 18th August 2023 in St. Tegan's hall. Both teams in 1973 took home Kiltegan's first ever hurling and camogie championship, breaking ground for so many future generations of Kiltegan

players. A minute's silence was held to remember all deceased players and club members. Fr. Pat O' Brien shared Grace Before Meals followed by he victorious team captains Sean Keogh and Josie Norton Dooley cutting the cake which was made by our very talented Mary Kelly (Feddan).

Refreshments were served by our committed volunteers where everyone enjoyed time to chat and recall these great times. Historic scrapbooks with paper clippings and photographic memorabilia from 1973 were perused bringing much laughter and nostalgia to the room. Speeches followed with Kiltegan GAA and Camogie President's Danny and Mary Byrne commending both teams on opening the doors to belief in our clubs and creating lifetime memories, followed by Wicklow County Chairperson Damien Byrne acknowledging the achievements of these teams, the rewards of which are still been reaped today. Hurling team selector and lifelong anchor of Kiltegan GAA John Timmins recalled some great stories from this time, with winning loyal hurling manager Martin Doogue sharing his memories on the journey of this great team. Padraig Byrne (hurler) and Josie Norton Dooley (camogie) spoke on behalf of the players and thanked everyone involved in organising the event, whilst sharing their happy memories on bringing the cups home to Kiltegan back in 1973. Current club secretaries of Kiltegan GAA and Camogie, Paula Boland and Ann Murphy invited each individual champion involved to come forward to receive their award. The night closed with Paula Boland reciting a poem in honour of these highly appreciated pioneering champions of Kiltegan GAA and Camogie Clubs, followed by Ciaran O' Toole closing a very special evening in Kiltegan.

Another good year for u7 hurling. We have a number of kids from outside Kiltegan who play, and that meant we were in a position to field a team here. Go Games were a little different in this case, because the format changed this summer; instead of playing lots of different teams, we played in the same group all the time, Western Gales, Knockananna, Carnew and ourselves.

In general, we managed to field 2 teams most nights (10-12 players). We were generally well able to compete against these clubs, and often won all games on a given night. In training and in the games, where capable, we were encouraging kids to lift and strike the ball. We see the same with Western Gaels, but not so much with the other clubs.

Like Football, the emphasis in training was around movement and some basic skills; ground/hand striking and jab lifts being the primary goals.

It's clear that the

improvement in these kid's abilities is in no small part due to the fact that there are regularly at least 4 coaches present, and the kids can be split into smaller groups, so exercises can be tailored more to each

We had a really strong year in u9 football. Early on in the season we had to play Tinahely, who we usually compare ourselves against, and we were comprehensively on top that morning. It was a good sign for the year ahead.

We adapted training a little this year to include more gamebased scenarios, and to encourage support play, and it was evident in the matches that this was working very well. more often than not, they looked for support before booting the ball. This meant that we really performed well during the year.

One team that really put it up to us was Coolkenno, and we played them twice during the year. These were great battles, and we were complimented on both occasions for the players that we had. And on our final's day in Ballinakill, we won all 3 games we were in, against Rathnew, Coolkenno and An Tochar.

## **U9 Hurling**

We had a noticeable decline in numbers this year, down 8 available players from the previous year.

It was a difficult year for hurling. To start with, we had the same 3 teams each year - Carnew, Knockananna and Western Gaels.

It should be noted that the league basis this year was noncompetitive, and results were text to the Co Board after games purely to assemble groups of similar ability, though this didn't prove the case with our U11s.

We had a very positive start to the year in U11 football in 2023 with a great win away to St Kevins. However, with the exception of a couple of games, it became obvious we were grouped in a strong group for our ability. To be fair to the lads, they grafted well and showed strong for periods, even in those games where we were well beaten.

We started from a panel of 17 players; however this number was realistically whittled down to 13 which proved difficult fielding teams (11 a side). This resulted in a number of fixtures being cancelled. We played 5 games away from home and 4 games at home. Compared to the hurling this year, the lack of games and stop start nature of the season as a result definitely had an impact on the development of the players.

I was personally contacted by Rathvilly GAA and Eire Og (Carlow) to play challenge matches, however we felt there was little to be gained from same, when our numbers were so poor. In an ideal world with a stronger panel (number wise) we would arrange these games, which would mean that the lack of league games would be nullified. This would be a channel I would like to see explored next year if the numbers were available.

Sadly, due to inclement weather, our final day blitz in Ballinakill was cancelled at the last minute. This would have provided the lads with much needed match time, even though games were limited to 7 mins a half. We did play Michael Dwyers U11 in Highpark in the week leading up to the blitz, where we again struggled but I would put that down to a lack of game time as opposed to being overrun.

## U15 Football

This year, Kiltegan GAA Club fielded an U15 Football team for the first time, which is a great achievement and a credit to all of the players, their parents, coaches and club members for making this possible.

The year began on 30th January in the gym in Kiltegan where the panel started their Strength and Conditioning training, coaches found that this worked well for the panel as it introduced the panel to the importance of S&C and built good habits among the panel.

We had a slow start to the year with two of our league games being postponed due to weather conditions and pitch availability which left us going into the Feile with minimal game time. We played Carnew, Naomh Eoin Gaels and An Tochar. Naomh Eoin Gaels topped the group. After a few more training sessions and games, we gathered some momentum and picked up a couple of big wins against Eire Og Greystones, Rathnew and An Tochar which left us finishing second in the League.

Preparation for championship was hindered slightly due to a couple of injuries but the squad continued to work hard and this came to fruition on Saturday 28th October when we played Annacurra in the Div.2 Championship Final in Coolkenno. Trailing by 3 points at the break, the boys continued to do all the right things and an excellent team goal put us into a great position. The panel worked hard to shut down any threats from Annacurra coming into the final moments of the game and the sound of Liam Keenan's whistle signalled that Kiltegan were champions.

It was a significant victory, because this same Annacurra panel beat these players in their u13 final 2 years earlier, and did so by quite a margin. That day, our defending let us down. the management team focussed heavily on defending with this group over the past 2 years. It was particularly satisfying to see

The league campaign proved to be a great warm up and learning curve for the team with wins over Michael Dwyers, Arklow Rocks, Eire Og 1, Western Gaels, Eire Og 2 and Glenealy and two losses against league winners Carnew and league runner ups Bray Emmets.

The Kings of the Garden County ended a stunning unbeaten championship campaign with a dramatic 1-point victory over a quality Bray Emmets side. A Sean Byrne point from a free in the fifth minute of added time proved to be the match winner. This win looked to be an unlikely outcome when Bray Emmets scored a goal to go five points up two minutes after the start of the second half asking some serious questions of the Luke O'Toole players. But boy did the Luke O'Toole players respond. Their never say die attitude came to the fore and slowly but surely, they brought themselves back into contention. Daniel
